



## **Latest Outcomes Reports: Participants, Families and Carers released**

The National Disability Insurance Agency (NDIA) has released the latest Outcomes Reports for NDIS participants, and their families and carers, using data available to 30 June 2022.

The following data covers

### **Autism:**

- **34%** of the participants in the NDIS (191,251 people) have a primary disability of autism and it is the most common disability type among participants. 90% of participants with autism are aged under 25 and 71% are male
- 73% of parents and carers for children with autism felt their child had become more independent as a result of the NDIS

### **Intellectual disability:**

- **16%** of the participants in the NDIS (86,120 people) have a primary disability of intellectual disability. 20% of participants with intellectual disability aged 18 years and over are in supported independent living
- For participants aged 15 to 64 years with an intellectual disability, 27% reported that they had a paid job at their latest reassessment. This compares to 23% for the Scheme as a whole

## Psychosocial disability:

- **10%** of the participants in the NDIS (58,122 people) have a primary disability of a psychosocial disability. 82% of participants with a psychosocial disability are aged 35 years and over.
- 76% of participants aged 15 years and over with a psychosocial disability said the NDIS has helped them have more choice and control over their life, aligning with the Scheme average rate at 76%

## Developmental delay:

- **9%** of the participants in the NDIS (52,179 people) have a primary disability of developmental delay. 88% of participants with developmental delay are under 7 years of age and 70% are male
- For children aged 0 to before starting school, 93% of parents and carers for children with developmental delay thought the NDIS improved their child's access to specialist services at their latest plan reassessment, compared to 90% at their first reassessment
